We all miss "the old internet" and we're all tired of social media. But what does that really mean?



Walled Gardens


Tech people often describe today's internet as being filled with walled gardens—platforms like Facebook, Instagram, and others that keep you locked inside their controlled ecosystems. By definition, a walled garden is "a software system where the carrier or service provider controls the applications, content, and media." But what does that really look like?

Imagine Facebook or Instagram as an apartment building. You've got your own space, and just outside your front door is a neatly trimmed little garden, surrounded by a high wall. You can wander the garden, sure, but you can't leave. Beyond that wall is the vast, open world of the internet: endless, unpredictable. unexpected. Inside the walled garden, you're protected from certain risks, but you're also kept away from the information, possibilities, and freedom that lay beyond.

Surveillance capitalism only makes the situation worse, think of third-parties setting up cameras inside of your apartment – and that's no way to live.

So what does this have to do with the indie web?

The indie web is the opposite of a walled garden. It's an open field: sprawling, untamed, and free. It might take a little more effort to navigate, but it's there for everyone. No locked gates. No gatekeepers. No third parties controlling what you can or can't see, do, or create.
